VISION QUEST shows the initiation of a Plains Indian boy which includes instruction by his elders, a sweat-bath, a ritual climb, a solitary fast and a vision of his guardian spirit.

PUEBLO HERITAGE deals with the Pueblo Indians of New Mexico, with special emphasis on the Taos, Zuni and Acoma Indians.

DANCES OF THE KWAKIUTL , a collection of sequences from the pantomimic dances which at one time belonged to the Winter ceremonial of the Kwakiutl Indians of British Columbia.

April 11 Henderson, The Rain King, by Saul Bellow

Esther Wagner, Ph.D., Tacoma, will discuss this fascinating novel about a millionaire who gets restless in middle age and is determined to pursue the call of his inner voice which says: "I want, I want, I want!" Henderson does not know what he wants and goes to Africa in the hope to find out. In alien cultures, among African tribes, he has dramatic opportunities of challenging and perhaps understanding himself. The novel contains much material that could be discussed from a Jungian point of view.

Esther Wagner, a member of the English Department of UPS, specializes in the teaching of creative writing. She has expressed the hope that those who plan to attend the meeting will read the book before (Fawcett paperback P 2114, \$ 1.25).

May 9 Prince Hatt Underground

A Scandinavian folktale which bears a striking resemblance to the myth of Amor and Psyche. A comparison between the two tales might be of special interest to those who are familiar with Erich Neumann's Amor and Psyche; The Psychic Development of the Feminine (Princeton Univ. Press, Bollingen Series LIV, paperback \$ 2.95).

Ali Willeford will read her translation of the Scandinavian tale, Bill Willeford will lead the discussion.

After lunch there will be a reading and discussion of a book by Richard E. Hughes, The Lively Image; Four Myths in Literature (Winthrop Publishers, Cambridge, Mass.)

In April, Nicoletta Misch will join the Tuesday group for a discussion and reading of Jung's Answer to Job. In this important book Jung argues that the evolution of the God concept of the psyche led to the dilemma of an arbitrary and even unjust God. This drama is crystallized in the story of Job which is also seen as a direct link from the Old to the New Testament.

Two Seminars with Dr. Louis Stewart, M.D., Berkeley

Saturday, March 5

10-12 a.m. and 1:30-3:30 p.m.

Morning session: Family Tree and the Tree of Life

Afternoon session: Genealogy as a Mythical Form

Dr. Stewart will discuss an important field largely neglected in Jungian psychology: the family as a social system, mediating between the individual and society and between psyche and culture. His special concern is with typical family constellations and their dynamism and with the significance of birth order among siblings. He correlates some of his findings with creative accomplishments of political leaders, artists and writers under varying historical conditions.

Dr. Stewart is a Jungian analyst in private practice in Berkeley, a training analyst of the C.G. Jung Institute in San Francisco and a Professor of Psychology at the San Francisco State University. He has published articles on the expression of personality in creative work and on the psychological factors in political leadership.
