Friday, February 19, 7:30 p.m. NATIVE AMERICAN STORYTELLING, SINGING & DRUMMING, with four tales from various Salish elders: Bear & Ant, Fox & Goat, Fox & Mother Raven and Star Story (a creation myth).

REBECCA CHAMBERLAIN FENWICK lectures for the Seattle Public Library on astronomy and star fore and works with the literature and oral traditions of the Puget Sound Salish people. She is a graduate student at the University of Washington and worked 4 1/2 years at the Pacific Science Center doing legend, Native American skills, and anthropological study at a NW Coast Indian Longhouse, as well as background research and script development on star-lore from various cultures.

Friday, March 12, 7:30 p.m. MR. HYDE, DR. JEKYLL AND DR. JUNG. An examination of Robert Louis Stevenson's "The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" as Victorian melodrama personifying C. G. Jung's concept of the autonomous complex. Jung contended that a complex, a constellation of psychic energy, was the basis for ego identification, and that other such constellations could exist, operating autonomously through separate egos. In this "strange case" habit strength becomes a rival of one-sided ego strength and when shadow is involved moral confrontation ensues.

EMMETT EARLY received his Ph. D. from Washington State University in clinical psychology. He recently began and directed Seattle's only storefront counseling program for Vietnam Veterans. Currently, he is in private practice in the Fremont district. Dr. Early studied Jung's Psychology in San Francisco and was in analysis with John Tally in 1968. He completed his Master's Thesis under direction of the Jungian psychologist Claire Thompson at WSU with the assistance of a grant from the C. G. Jung Institute of San Francisco.
