Masculine and Feminine: Inner and Outer Aspects

This lecture/workshop series presented by distinguished Jungian analysts continues with the Winter session.

This lecture will propose that the archetypal basis of the feminine lies in the Great Round, and it is this which we must understand if we are to fully comprehend the nature and power of the feminine. For the Great Round is that cyclic mystery of change which moves from empty to full to empty, from beginning to end to beginning. We see the Great Round in nature, in woman's physiological cycles, in human endeavor, and in the rise and fall of institutions and civilizations. It is eternal and complete; Goddess images are partial glimpses that come and go. Thus to comprehend the Great Round is to comprehend wholeness and to understand why we are fragmented, stuck or neurotic.

Three myths which span the ages of human experience will be examined in depth in order to understand the Great Round and see its implications for our lives and perhaps our immortality.

Because of our society and the greater social influence of men, most adult women have excluded many qualities of personal authority and competence from their identity. Individuation, *i.e.* the successful integration of unconscious complexes over a lifetime, involves the process of achieving unity with the animus and is a prominent element in the therapy of all adult women. As women assume responsibility for qualities projected onto men, we experience a stronger sense of personal authority and self-determination, confidence, and self-esteem.

A series of six presentations, viewing the collective unconscious through the myths and gods of mankind, this series will explore Jungian concepts in order to provide an understanding of the way these shared images from antiquity affect us in our daily lives today.

Dionysus</p> <p>Dionysus is most commonly associated with wine and intoxication. The Collective Unconscious: a vast reservoir of the collective memories of mankind, all of the myths and madness, all the gods and devils, the source of all human creativity, and more. What is it? Lecture: Individuation and the Kundalini Chakra System

Jung's description of Individuation, or the emergence of the Self in the individual, includes the most basic process of projection and its gradual withdrawal 'from the world'. Jung drew deeply from the wealth of experience in the East as well as his own European tradition in order to find an adequate framework for articulating this process.

The Kundalini Chakra system, born in India thousands of years ago, can offer such a framework via its rich and complex symbolism. The system can help us in the West to understand the nature of projection, its withdrawal, and its place in the life-long task of Individuation.

The purpose of the evening will be to show a little of the beauty and depth of Kundalini that is accessible to a Westerner and to illustrate, by story, personal experience and by appeal to the symbols themselves, how the chakras are such a framework for understanding the process and effects of projection and its withdrawal.

John Radecki lives in Kirkland where he has a private practice. He has travelled to and lived in different parts of the world including Australia and India. Much of the seminar's content is the fruit of such journeys.
