Psyche and Sound: The Use of Music in Jungian Analysis • Patricia Warming, M.A., M.Div.

Throughout his life's work, Dr. C.G. Jung gave primacy to the psyche and its manifestation in dreams and imagination. In a letter Dr. Jung wrote in 1950, he added that music expresses in sounds what fantasies and visions express in visual images. This presentation will be an overview of the way in which music can help us to reach those deeper recesses of the psyche/soul that words often cannot touch. Work with sound and music can help to access memories, connect with deep emotions, facilitate work with imagery, and connect us to our bodies. This can help us to experience both the vibrational and psychic energies necessary for wholeness.

The program will include some video clips demonstrating the vibrational effects of sound on matter where we can observe archetypal patterns created solely by sound. We will engage in some listening exercises.

Patricia Warming is a Jungian analyst in private practice in Seattle. She received her graduate degrees from Princeton Theological Seminary and the C.G. Jung Institute in Zurich, Switzerland. Her college degree is in music. She is a member of Jungian Analysts •North Pacific and the International Association for Analytical Psychology. Warming is the author of an article entitled "Psyche and Sound" published in Music and Miracles, a new book compiled by Don Campbell.

Society Library Notes and scholars. Sadly, psychologists have failed to understand very much about this rich source of archetypally symbolic material, material that is relevant not only to African Americans, but to people in all places and all times who struggle with issues of internal and external oppression.

In this presentation, Dr. Arthur Jones will sing a sampling of representative spirituals, interspersed with a discussion of the history of the cultural foundations of these songs, with particular attention to how their symbolic meanings and functions can be understood within a Jungian framework. He will be accompanied on piano by Ingrid Thompson.

Arthur Jones holds a Ph.D. in clinical psychology from the University of Iowa and maintains a part-time practice in Denver. He is a senior lecturer in the Department of Psychology at Denver University, where he teaches courses in Jungian and multicultural psychology. His singing career began in high school, when he sang with a select chorus of New York City singers and performed on television with the group. He was in a touring choir while in college, but then took many years off before returning to music. He has been a chorister with the Opera Colorado chorus and a tenor soloist at Washington Park United Methodist Church in Denver. Dr. Jones has found that his lecture-recital programs on African-American spirituals combines his interests as a teacher, scholar, and singer. Following a series of programs in the Denver area in the winter of 1992, Dr. Jones and Ingrid Thompson have given presentations in New York and Colorado. Dr. Jones' new book on spirituals, Wade in the Water, will be published by Orbis Books in August 1993.

Ingrid Thompson has been studying and playing piano since she was 10. She attended Whittier College and the University of Colorado at Boulder and graduated from Denver University's Lamont School of Music. She has been the organist and choirmaster at several Episcopal churches in Colorado and has studied with and accompanied Alethia Kisling.

Divine Trickster, Holy Fool: Agent Provocateur for the Self • David Hufford, M.A.

This lecture will explore the most elusive of archetypal images—the Trickster. A variety of examples, both mythological and clinical, including Native American Trickster figures, Hopi Clowns, Hermes, alchemical Mercurius, and Zen/Taoist fools and sages, will be used to help shed light on the vital role the Trickster plays as an agent for the Self. Trickster energy can be experienced in various ways—sometimes playful, sometimes destructive or demonic. But we shall see how it is ultimately in the service of individuation, through the relationship between the Ego and the Self. The more we can become aware of this energy in our own lives, the more it can be experienced as helpful rather than harmful.

David Hufford is a Jungian-oriented psychotherapist with a private practice in Seattle. He holds a master's degree in clinical psychology from Seattle University and has a background in spiritual studies and the visual arts. The focus of his work includes helping others with life transitions and relationship difficulties as well as issues of loss, grief, and renewal.

Once Upon a Mid-Life: Fairy Tales and the Psychology of Men and Women at Mid-Life

Handed down over centuries, fairy tales are treasuries of folk wisdom. This lecture will focus on a unique and much-neglected group of stories that address the issues of mid-life. Tales from around the world will be retold and discussed, focusing on the contrasting psychological tasks men and women face in the middle years: transforming youthful ideals into practical action; breaking free of traditional masculine and feminine stereotypes; coming to terms with death, fate, and tragedy; and finding healing in a deep inner source of life.

Prince Charming and Cinderella Revisited: The Journey of Middle and Late Life in Fairy Tales

Saturday, May 8 • 10 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. Cornish North • 1501 Tenth Ave. E. \$50 members, \$60 nonmembers

This workshop will take a deeper look at fairy tales about mid-life and then introduce another group of stories specifically about old age. Tales from around the world will be retold and their meaning discussed. Fairy tales about mid-life address such issues as giving up the magic and innocence of youth; men coming to terms with their inner feminine, and women with their inner masculine; and finding creativity and renewal in the turmoil of mid-life changes. Fairy tales about later life emphasize confronting loss and despair; being open to the return of magic; and finding wisdom and spiritual illumination. In addition to storytelling and discussion, participants will have the opportunity to act out fairy-tale skits and use visualization to discover their own inner stories, awakening the storyteller within.

Allan B. Chinen, M.D., is a psychiatrist in private practice in San Francisco and associate clinical professor, psychiatry, at the University of California, San Francisco. He is the author of In the Ever After: Fairy Tales and the Second Half of Life and Once Upon a Mid-Life: Classic Stories and Mythic Tales to Illuminate the Middle Years, and a forthcoming book, Beyond the Hero: Tales of the Deep Masculine.
