THEME: The New Millennium



James Hollis, Ph.D. Lecture: Ends, Beginnings, Apocalypse: Envisioning the Millennium

Though our calendars are arbitrary dating systems, the sense of ending, of beginning, of closure, completion of cycle, possibly of apocalypse, invites our projections, stokes our fantasies, and occasions large images. What do these thoughts, fantasies, visions tell us about history, about ourselves,

about how our psyche works? Jung said every psychology is a subjective confession; thus, our millennialist visions reveal the invisible workings of the unconscious and what directs our lives whether we know it or not. What can reading the millennialist visions tell us about ourselves?

Workshop: Relationships: The Encounter of Self with Other

The quality of our relationships with others can never rise above the quality of our relationship to ourselves. As the level of our personal development can only approximate the achievement of consciousness, so we are inevitably drawn to contract relationships through unconscious processes, projections, and hidden transactions. This workshop will focus on three arenas of relationships: parent-child, which helps form our personality in profound ways, interpersonal, which is often troubled by the unconsicous processes of each party, and self-divine, where the journey of the individual soul takes its place in the larger quest for meaning. In these three modalities of relationship our lives play their course, with the only consistent element being the presence of self. Accordingly, we will focus on the questions which we need to ask of ourselves in order to enhance the relationship to self, which may then enhance the relationship to the Other.

James Hollis, Ph.D., is a Zurich-trained Jungian analyst in practice in Houston, Texas where he is also Director of the C.G. Jung Educational Center. He is a training analyst for the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts. Additionally, he is the author of numerous books; his most recent work is *The Eden Project: In Search of the Magical Other*, a depth psychological approach to relationships.

Virginia Apperson Lecture: In Search of the Coniunctio: Finding the Elusive Heroine

Coniunctio, a coming together, a meeting of opposites, a reconciliation. Is it possible? What will it take to enable, support and encourage such a process in a still predominantly patriarchal — thus, non-relational — culture? In this lecture, we will uncover a feminine potential which exhibits the subtleties that too often get squelched in an extraverted, concretizing world. From "The Raven" to Jane Austen, from Colette to the Indigo Girls, we will address a deep hunger in our culture that has not yet been satiated. The challenge is to envision civil rights and equal rights as much as an intrapsychic and



interpersonal issue as it has been a political one, to strive for a deep respect and valuing of the Other.

Workshop: Honoring the Tension

Through creative exercises and discussion, we will have an opportunity to look at the opposing forces in our own lives, allowing both sides to speak, trusting that something new can be born from the two.

Virginia Apperson, M.N., R.N., C.S., is a Jungian analyst who has worked in a variety of psychiatric settings ranging from an inpatient adolescent chemical dependency unit to psychiatric consultation-liaison work in an inner city hospital to an outpatient eating disorders clinic. Her interest in finding ways to tap into the depths of her clients' and her own creative potential drew her to analytical psychology and eventually led her to training at the C.G. Jung Institute in Zurich. She is currently in private practice in Atlanta, Georgia.

> Naomi Ruth Lowinsky Lecture: The Language of Soul: Psychotherapy as a Poetic Form

Poetry is Psyche's first language, taking us back to the beginnings of human culture. Psychotherapy can be seen as a recent form of an ancient practice: a sacred space for words; a place to say the unsayable, to name the unnameable, to talk to ghosts and to the gods.

It was Jung's premise that the realm of the imagination — the place where conscious and

unconscious meet — is where psychological transformation begins. In a deep psychotherapy the soul is released from whatever has confined her, to speak in her own native tongue.

The poet H.D. (Hilda Doolittle) gives us an intimate glimpse into this process in her memoir about her analysis with Sigmund Freud.

Workshop: Writing from the Depths

Remember us the language from the bottom of it all low in sky

We will devote this day to seeking our own deep language, our native tongue: words that held mana in childhood; words that remember those awful and awesome experiences that shape our lives. Using active imagination and writing exercises, we will seek our personal language of the soul.

Naomi Ruth Lowinsky is a published poet, an analyst member of the C.G. Jung Institute of San Francisco, author of *The Motherline: Every Woman's Journey to Find Her Female Roots*, and poetry and fiction editor of *Psychological Perspectives*. She speaks and publishes widely on the feminine and the creative. Her essay on H.D., "Our Lady of the Pomogranate," appeared in the Fall '97 issue of the *San Francisco Jung Institute Library Journal*.

JPA Announces Annual Its Public Program

Thawing the "Frozen Accidents:" The Archetypal Dimensions of Transference and Countertransference

The Jungian Psychotherapists Association (JPA) of Seattle proudly hosts Beverley Zabriske, Jungian analyst and author, as presenter for a clinical seminar. Ms. Zabriske will explore pivotal developmental moments ("frozen accidents") which manifest as chronic symptomatic patterns in our waking and dreaming lives. Her presentation will also apply Jung's archetypal perspective toward identifying how we speak about and listen to these symptomatic patterns, as well as how to attune ourselves to these dynamics in the transference and countertransference relationships.

Ms. Zabriske, CSW, NCPsyA, is on the faculty of the C.G. Jung Institute of New York, of which she is a graduate, and the C.G. Jung Center of Mexico City. She is an assistant editor of the *Journal of Analytical Psychology*, and a past president of the National Association for the Advancement of Psychoanalysis. Her published articles include: "Thawing the Frozen Accidents: The Archetypal Dimension of Countertransference," "The Matter of Psyche," "Jungian Ethics," and "Living Myths."

The Jungian Psychotherapists Association is an organization for master's and doctoral level therapists who use a Jungian perspective in clinical work. Once each year, JPA offers a clinical seminar to the depth therapeutic community; this event is open to the public.

Driving Directions

Directions to the Good Shepherd Center 4649 Sunnyside Avenue North:

From Interstate 5, take the 45th Street exit. Travel west toward Wallingford. Turn right from 45th onto Sunnyside Avenue North and travel to the Center on the left side of the street at 4649, just before Sunnyside intersects with 50th Street. Follow entry drive left to the parking lot south of the building. Enter the building at the main entrance.

Directions to the University Unitarian Church 6556 - 35th Avenue Northeast:

From Northbound I-5, take the Ravenna Blvd./N.E. 65th St. exit (exit #170). Once off the exit, continue ahead, through the stop sign, on 8th N.E. At the first traffic light, turn right onto N.E. 65th Street. Go about one mile and turn left onto 35th Avenue N.E. Go less than one block, and the University Unitarian Church is on the right side of the street. If traveling by bus, take Metro route 25, 40, 65, or 71.



From Southbound I-5, take the N.E. 71st/N.E. 65th Streets exit (exit #171). Once off the exit, turn left onto N.E. 71st Street and go over the freeway, where the road turns into N.E. 70th Street. At the first traffic light, turn right onto Roosevelt Way N.E. Go five blocks and turn left onto N.E. 65th St. Go exactly one mile and turn left onto 35th Avenue N.E. Go less than one block, and the University Unitarian Church is on the right side of the street. If traveling by bus, take Metro route 25, 40, 65, or 71.
