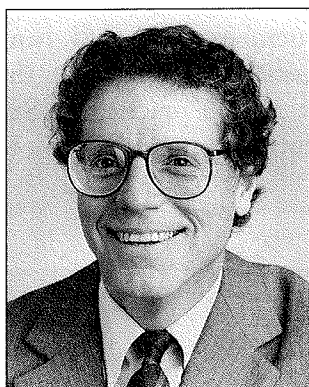

John Beebe, M.D. *Lecture: The Future of Depth Psychology*

It will soon be a hundred years since Sigmund Freud first published *The Interpretation of Dreams*, inaugurating the analysis of the unconscious as a popular personal practice and attracting the attention of C.G. Jung. What are the frontiers of this psychology as it enters its second century?

Workshop: Further Into Character

Dr. John Beebe's work on psychological types and integrity has led him to a new understanding of the Jungian individuation story — one which he feels is more appropriate for a postmodern age than the heroic model of the unconscious presented at the height of the twentieth century by Erich Neumann and Joseph Campbell. In this workshop he will discuss the images and stages of individuation as he finds them in contemporary analysis and culture.

Dr. John Beebe is a Jungian analyst in private practice in San Francisco. Founding editor of the quarterly *San Francisco Jung Institute Library Journal*, he has lectured on the I Ching, psychological types, moral character, and film throughout the United States and in Europe, and his writings and ideas on these topics have appeared in many Jungian journals and books. Dr. Beebe is the author of *Integrity in Depth*, a study of the archetype of integrity.

Neil Russack, M.D.***Lecture: Animals & What They Say to Us***

This presentation will be about animals — not the animal as endangered specie or as pet, but the animal within our psyche; the way we give birth to them within our souls, the way they give birth to us.

The focus of this lecture will be on the waterbird as it flies free across the waters, away from the known to the world beyond. In a man's dream a flock of geese suddenly becomes airborne, inspiring him to chance an artistic career. A duck in a drawing fetches a woman trapped on dry land and swims with her on its back into the waters, and for the first time she finds she is able to love. In a Japanese fairy tale, a man rescues a crane; in gratitude, this non-human female transforms herself into a woman and marries him.

If we listen to what the animals tell us, we could develop a more trusting relation to the process of life's unfolding, a more spontaneous and playful attitude, and a more intuitive feel for choices and decisions.

Workshop: Animals & What They Say to Us

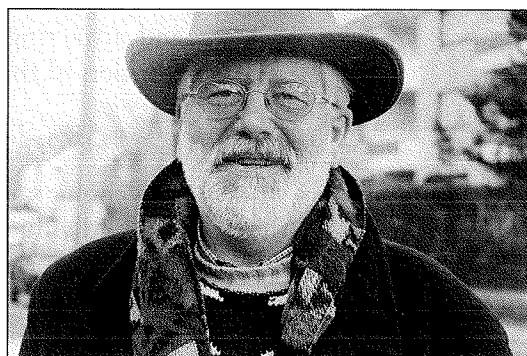
In this workshop, Dr. Russack will draw from clinical examples to present some more general information about animals and what psychological meaning they carry for us, from both an historical and his own magical perspective. Time permitting, he will present two additional animals in more depth — the snake and the horse.

Neil Russack, M.D., is a psychiatrist and Jungian analyst, a member of the C.G. Jung Institute of San Francisco as well as assistant clinical professor in psychiatry at the University of California, San Francisco. He is currently in private practice in San Francisco. The material to be presented in this lecture represents a chapter of a book in progress.

Peter H. Elting, Ph.D.***Lecture: The Limping Puer
Who Leads into the New
Millennium***

In Jungian thought the Puer is part of the hero archetype. His characteristics are flying and leaping, rather than limping. Today's society is one of the "forever

young." In this lecture we will look at the limping and laming of the Puer as a necessary reconciliation between the extreme points of the archetypal constellation of Puer and Senex. It is necessary to limp as part of our transition into a new epoch. We slow down to find grounding and endure emptiness and shame, and because new growth requires it. Some of the Greek myths will help us understand the importance of the limp.

***Workshop: The Limping Puer***

We will focus on personal and collective images of the Puer and use Jungian psychodrama as a way to enter the "limping" images of Puer and Puella. We will uniquely combine

Jung's theories with the psychodrama techniques of J.L. Moreno. Participants are encouraged to bring life experiences, stories, or dreams for enactment.

Peter H. Elting, Ph.D. is a Jungian analyst. After an extended career in business he completed his training at the C.G. Jung Institute and the Institute for Psychodrama in Zurich. In his practice he focuses on life transitions and dream enactment. He is a member of Jungian Analysts•North Pacific, the International Association for Analytical Psychology, and the American Society of Group Psychotherapy and Psychodrama.

Centerpoint Course Offerings

A series of group-oriented self study programs about Carl Jung and his work are available from the Centerpoint organization. Programs are conducted by audiotape and each student is provided with a printed transcript. The programs are divided into sessions, with discussion questions at the end of each session. To encourage discussion and the sharing of ideas these courses are designed to be taken in a group of two or more students. Each student pays for his or her own set of books. The epigram to this issue of the newsletter was cited by our autumn keynote speaker, James Hollis, as the most important paragraph written in the twentieth century. To paraphrase Jung: We still carry the psychic facts that gave rise to the birth of the gods, but our gods have become diseases. How, then, to relate to god, and to this unrelated part of our collective psyche? If you missed Jim Hollis's presentation, but find this problem as intriguing as I do, you might want to look at his books *Swamplands of the Soul* and *The Eden Project*.

Plans are in the works to conclude programs of this, our twenty-fifth anniversary year, with a showing of two films, one of which has never before been shown publicly. The first, *Matter of Heart*, is a 1985 film about the life and work of Carl Jung featuring rare home movies, archival footage, and a wealth of interviews. The second film is as yet untitled; it consists of interviews with the late Jungian analyst Marie-Louise von Franz. Filmmakers George and Suzanne Wagner will be on hand for what I hope will be a lively question-and-answer session following each film. Thanks go to Lucretia Devine for putting this program into place.

Long-time Jung Society member Connie Eichenlaub recently earned her Ph.D. in comparative literature from the University of Washington; she brings her facility with words to the position of board secretary.



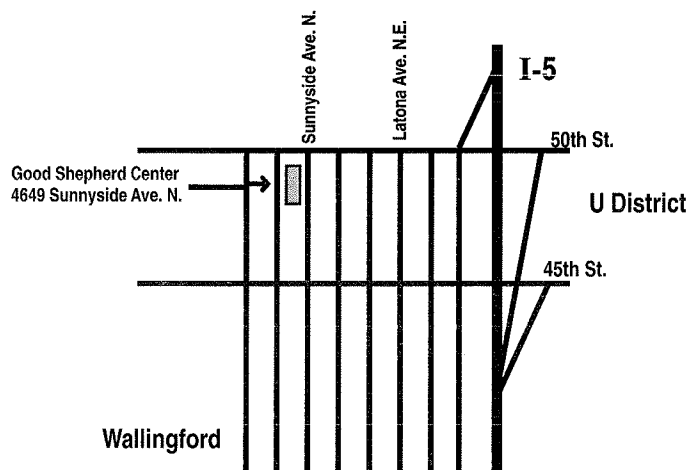
