Lecture:

A Depth Psychological Approach to the Sacred

When our spirituality cannot be contained within traditional institutions, there is an urgent need for new ways to articulate our experience of the sacred. This lecture describes an approach to spirituality based on personal experience of the sacred, using the language of depth psychology rather than traditional theology.

Dr. Corbett trained in medicine and psychiatry in England, and as a Jungian Analyst at the C.G. Jung Institute of Chicago. His primary dedication is to the religious function of the psyche, especially the way in which personal religious experience is relevant to individual psychology and to the development of psychotherapy as a spiritual practice. He is the author of *The Religious Function of the Psyche* (Routledge), *Psyche and the Sacred* (forthcoming from Spring publications), the Sounds True audio series *Spirituality Beyond Religion*, and various articles on the depth psychological approach to spirituality. Dr. Corbett is on the faculty of Pacifica Graduate Institute in Santa Barbara, California.

Saturday Workshop: The Self as Totality: Jung and Nonduality

Traditional Jungian thought emphasizes the ego-Self axis, which implies a relationship between an ego and a Self as if these were separate. However, Jung also thinks of the Self as the totality of the psyche, in which case the ego cannot be a separate entity or the word "totality" would not be meaningful. If the psyche or consciousness is truly undivided, depth psychology must adopt a nondualistic ontology which links our field to the nondualistic spiritual traditions.

It seems counterintuitive to insist that reality is a unity and that our apparent separateness is an illusion. Yet, synchronistic events and advances in quantum physics lend support to this idea. This workshop considers some of the theoretical and clinical implications of the notion of the Self as the totality of consciousness.

In this six-session course you will be introduced to the process of symbol representation and fantasy play in the child's self perception, relationship to family, and relationship to his or her essential Self. The course is offered to anyone interested in the child's process, including mental health and other professionals, and parents. It will include some treatment methods, but the focus will be primarily on the child's expression of his view of the world and how the Self guides the healing process when difficulties arise.

Class 1 – Thursday, October 12: Interpretation of Drawings

Geri Grubbs and Susan Jenkins

A series of drawings made by four children will be presented with a focus on the child's portrayal of internal trauma, sense of self, and the self of the family system. Presenting problems include death of a parent and sexual abuse.

Class 2 – Thursday, October 19: Guided Imagery and Fantasy Methods

Group will experience and learn how to use guided imageries with children.

Class 3 – Thursday, October 26: A Jungian Approach to Conjoint Therapy

Susan Jenkins

Floor fantasy play that includes themes of mother, father, death, birth, love and hate will be presented and discussed. This floor method is particularly therapeutic with children who are not accustomed to creative expression, withdrawn, or who are inexperienced in shared play.

Class 4 – Thursday, November 2: Introduction to Sandplay Therapy

Group will learn how to conduct a sandplay session and what to look for in a series of sandtrays made by a child. The sandplay process of an 11-year-old, spiritually evolved girl will be presented.

Class 5 – Thursday, November 9: When the Dark Side Becomes Constellated

Group will learn about the affect of sexual abuse on the developing psyche and how it is revealed in the sandplay process of a 10-yr. old boy that includes images of the archetypal defense gone awry and the drive of the Self to become whole.

Lecture:

Against Ismene: Is Reductionism A Western Plague?

Reductionism is a cognitive attitude that is typical of Western thinking. It replaces different kinds of experience and points of view with one alone. It seduces the observer with its functionality but impoverishes the observed object. It starts already with ancient Greek philosophy but explodes with Decartes, whose *cogito ergo sum* (I think, therefore I am) reduces the psyche to the conscious ego (hence psychoanalysis has to be invented).

Gradually, the West reduces narration to entertainment and art to investment. Racism and other degenerations of the social fabric reduce the neighbor to the "other." Consumerism and the repression of rituals, particularly those surrounding death, reduce life to the "here and now." The loss of the symbolic dimension reduces our experience to the materialistic dimension. Loneliness and depression of modern humans can be discussed from this perspective. The confrontation between the holist and the reductionist perspectives can be summarized by the confrontation between Sophocles' heroine Antigone and her sister Ismene.


Jungian Psychotherapists Association Public Lecture: The Father: Past and Present

It is a commonplace to say that the last part of the 20th Century has seen a retreat of the father. But when did this retreat start? To many, father and patriarchy still seemed invincible one century ago. But a deeper psycho-historical analysis suggests that the father is something recent, fragile, and relative. Unlike the mother, he is mostly a cultural construction. We shall discuss his pre-historical origin. His best days came with Western classical antiquity, whose myths celebrate him but at the same time unconsciously try to compensate his precarious condition.

All major events of the last two Centuries are connected with a crisis of the father: the American and French Revolution against the Kings; the Industrial Revolution, which transforms the patriarch into a chain-worker; the two World Wars and the Vietnam War, which transform young fathers into veterans; and the defeat of the Terrible Fathers (= the dictators of the 20th Century). That historical and symbolic gradual demise reaches us through the collective unconscious. The alarming amount of fathers separated from their children in every corner of the Western world shouldn't therefore be seen as a sum of individual cases. It is the last manifestation of a century-old phenomenon, and we should discuss it accordingly.

The workshop will discuss individual modern experiences and will also re-visit the three most deeply seated classical characters of Western collective unconscious: Hector of the *Iliad*; Ulysses of the *Odyssey*; and Aeneas of the *Aeneid*. The ambivalence between father and competitive male will be analyzed and discussed in terms of present-day problems. A series of slides will show images of fathers, in different places and times. They represent many graduations, from authoritarian to soft, and should also offer opportunity for discussion.



5. Practice working through sample dream exercises.

Lecture

Finding meaning in the second half of life requires asking larger questions of ourselves and challenging our values. To ask these questions the following three things are required: 1) that we recover a sense of personal authority; 2) that we strike a better balance between obligation to others and obligation to self; and 3) that we construct a more mature spirituality. How do we recover our lives, grow as persons, and become increasingly at home with the person we are becoming?

Workshop

We can never be free to create our lives if we are in service to fixed, internalized, and largely unconscious ideas. We will engage questions which stir, sift, and raise consciousness of these deeply ingrained "ideas" which autonomously govern our lives. With increased consciousness comes increased possibility of the recovery of a more authentic journey. (Please bring a pad and pen for journaling).

Phil Cousineau

Lecture: Joseph Campbell and the Art of Pilgrimage

All true journeys are pilgrimages to the heart.
- Joseph Campbell



During the panel discussion after the world premier of *The Hero's Journey: The World of Joseph Campbell*, at the Director's Guild in Hollywood, in 1987, Professor Campbell was asked what might help the world become a better place. Campbell's laconic answer stunned the audience and has puzzled readers and students of his work ever since: "Tourism." After the laughter died down, Campbell went on to say, "Go out and meet someone new. Learn a new language, another mythology and religion. If enough people did just that, we might see the beginning of the end of the demonization of other peoples around the world."

In this evening's presentation best-selling author and award-winning documentary filmmaker Phil Cousineau will give a multimedia performance that will explore Campbell's deeply held belief that there are fascinating parallels between spiritual pilgrimage and the mythic quest. For Campbell, the two journeys were the inner and outer manifestation of what he called "the soul's high adventure." For us, the emphasis will be on how uncannily prescient Campbell's remarks were. According to the United Nations, by the year 2000 tourism became the number one industry in the world.


While tourists circumambulate the globe at record rates, pilgrimage - the transformation journey to a sacred site - is enjoying a revival not seen since the Middle Ages. More than ever, people are seeking out sacred travel as a means of cross-cultural understanding as well as spiritual and psychological practice. Cousineau will draw from his own work on *The Hero's Journey*, including rarely seen outtakes of Campbell, as well as a slide presentation from his book, the internationally acclaimed, *The Art of Pilgrimage*. We will also have ample discussion based on Campbell's own odysseys around the world and the fifteen literary tours and pilgrimages that Cousineau has led to sacred places from Ireland to India.

A Workshop with Phil Cousineau: *Joseph Campbell at the Movies*

Joseph Campbell is well known for his contributions to the realms of mythological studies. His work has helped millions of readers to see the role of the mythic imagination in literature, religion, and psychology. But less well known is his enormous influence in the modern storyteller's cave of the movies.

In this workshop we will explore Campbell's relationship to the mythic dimension of film. We will discuss the movie stars that influenced him as a boy, such as Charlie Chaplin and Douglas Fairbanks, his role as President of the Creative Film Foundation, in New York, in the early 1950s, and his extraordinary impact on directors such as Stanley Kubrick, George Miller, Chris Columbus, and George Lucas.

Throughout the workshop we will explore, through the use of film clips, stories, and open discussion, the mythic structure of movies, the use and abuse of archetypes in film, the role of dream in moviemaking, and the phenomenal popularity of the hero's journey model in Hollywood, and the resurgence of mythic themes in contemporary films such as *Whale Rider*, *The Matrix*, *The Lion, Witch, and Wardrobe*, and *The Lord of the Rings*.

Depth psychology is a pilgrimage psychology—the devotional journeys after Individuation are fascinating both within the individual Psyche and within the collective Psyche. Jung found such peregrinations as he wandered the earth his whole career. He found outer grounding for the inner journeying. It is hoped that this pilgrimage will elucidate that same inner spiraling-after-depth in each of us as participants.

We will walk an ancient path across verdant Galicia—once sacred to ancient Celtic gods and then to the deep mystical stirrings in all three current western monotheistic traditions. This pilgrimage possibility seems especially urgent given the religious war currently being waged between the three ancient Western Monotheisms—all traditions with strong pilgrimage practices built on top of forgotten Goddess practices. Can pilgrimage bring something toward planetary peace and healing as well as individual psycho-spiritual growth? This trip commences with that desire and vision.

Call for Papers: Joseph Campbell and the Power of Myth

Proposals due by November 15th, 2006.

In 1974, Joseph Campbell was the first speaker at the group that became the C. G. Jung Society, Seattle. In the spring of 2007, the Jung Society will host a series of evenings for paper presentations and discussion of Campbell's influence. To kick off the series, the December lecture and workshop will feature Phil Cousineau, writer and filmmaker who made the biographical film, *The Hero's Journey*, about Campbell's life journey.



Proposals are now being accepted for presentations in an area designed to explore Campbell and his ideas about myth, their influence and application in literature, film, and popular culture. James Hollis is a Zurich-trained Jungian analyst in private practice in Houston, Texas. He is executive director of The Jung Educational Center of Houston, which offers a wide variety of courses in depth psychology and the expressive arts to support individuals in their search of psychological and spiritual meaning. He is the author of eleven books, including *The Middle Passage: From Misery to Meaning at Mid-Life*; *Creating a Life*; *On This Journey We Call Our Life*; and *Finding Meaning in the Second Half of Life*. Hollis travels around the United States lecturing to audiences of students and peers on Jungian theories of human development and what he calls "the meeting point of psyche and soul."
