Elizabeth Clark Stern, M.A., L.M.H.C. Writing From Within: Creating Stories As A Road Map For The Soul

How do we nurture our creativity and use writing as a tool for enhancing self-knowledge and personal growth? How can crafting stories filled with fresh images and conflict, help us learn more about our inner life? What is the relationship between stories and the tools of analytical psychology, such as active imagination and the interpretation of dreams?



We will explore these questions in the four-week course, *Writing From Within: Creating Stories As A Road Map For The Soul.* For two hours each evening, we will engage in group and individual writing exercises and sharing. Together we will create a nonjudgmental atmosphere of playfulness, respect, sharing, and inquiry.

This class is offered for writers at all levels of proficiency. Your desire to participate is the only criteria. Continuing Education Credits are available for mental health/social work professionals with the following learning objectives:

- 1. Increase the participants' abilities to use creative writing as a tool for personal healing and growth.
- 2. Develop the participants' understanding of how the dynamics of story relate to Active Imagination and other aspects of Analytical Psychology.

Bring a notebook and a pen for writing exercises, assignments, and journaling.

Suggested Texts: Writing As A Way Of Healing by Louise De Salvo; The Art Of Dramatic Writing: Its Basis In The Creative Interpretation Of Human Motives by Lajos Egri; Active Imagination by Barbara Hannah

Chapter assignments will be offered in each text. Should you choose to purchase them, used copies are often available on Amazon.com. Be sure to go to the Jung Society web site for the link to Amazon. This will benefit the Jung Society.

CLASS 1: IMAGE

Thursday, September 20

Introduction of the course themes, followed by individual and group writing exercises. Sharing of questions and goals participants have for the class. Discussion of the role of the unconscious and the power of imagery in the creative process, as a tool for awareness, exploration, and healing. Assignment: chapters from the texts; writing assignment.

CLASS 2: CREATING A CHARACTER

Thursday, September 27

Discussion/sharing of writing assignment. Writing as healing: a way to know yourself - emotion - memory. Characterization: where does it come from? Protagonist's motivation as the driving force of story. Writing exercise. Sharing. Facets of characterization: behavior, "the want," voice. Assignment: Writing assignment; chapters from texts.

CLASS 3: CONFLICT AND TRANSFORMATION

Thursday, Oct. 4

Sharing of writing assignments. Why is conflict necessary for transformation? When the "wants" of characters collide. The "unity of opposites." Writing exercise. Sharing. Discussion. Assignment: Writing assignment and chapters from the texts.

CLASS 4- Thursday, Oct. 11 - STORY AND MEANING

Sharing of writing assignment. Perspective of Active Imagination. Story as Dream Analysis. Writing exercise. Sharing. Final thoughts. Closing guided imagination.

Elizabeth Clark Stern, M.A., L.M.H.C., is a psychotherapist in private practice in Seattle. She is a graduate of the two-year Professional Seminar of the North Pacific Institute for Analytical Psychology. Prior to her beloved career in psychotherapy, she spent thirteen years as a screenwriter in Los Angeles, with works produced for commercial and public television. She taught screenwriting for Five years at the University of Washington Film and Video School, and "Writing and Therapy" at Antioch University. To Miguel Serrano, Jung said: "Nobody understands what I mean. Only a poet could begin to understand." In a reply to a criticism by Martin Buber, Jung commented: "I poetize." This presentation will argue that a poetic quality is crucial to a true depth psychology, not poetic in a Romantic sense, but in a Modernist and Postmodernist sense. Jung's view that poetry "needs no meaning, for meaning has nothing to do with art," will be seen to echo Archibold MacLeish's lines: "A poem should not mean / But be."





Lecture & Workshop

Jung began to examine astrology as early as 1911, when he mentioned his inquiries in a letter to Freud. ("My evenings are taken up very largely with astrology. I make horoscopic calculations in order to



Yet astrology runs so directly counter to the long-established cosmology that encompasses the modern world view that one can well appreciate Jung's reluctance to make more public the extent of his use of astrology; he had already pushed the envelope about as far as possible. For the same reason we can understand the resistance of many Jungian analysts to further exploration of the astrological direction their founder had pursued.

However, recently published research by Richard Tarnas, Stanislav Grof, and others gives new support for Jung's intuition of the value of astrology and of the trans-psychic (or "psychoid") nature of the archetypes. These observations suggest the existence of an extraordinarily consistent synchronistic correspondence between planetary movements and the archetypal patterns of human experience, reflecting something like a cosmic *anima mundi* in which the human being participates.

In Friday evening's lecture, Richard Tarnas will summarize the nature of this evidence, discuss the new light it sheds on the human psyche and the unfolding drama of history, and explore the implications it holds for Jungian psychology.

Saturday will be devoted to a more in-depth survey of the observed archetypal correlations, the relevant principles of astrological analysis, and the new horizon of possibility this perspective opens up for facilitating both individuation and collective self-awareness.



Richard Tarnas is professor of philosophy and psychology at the California Institute of Integral Studies, where he founded its graduate program in Philosophy, Cosmology, and Consciousness. He also teaches on the faculty of the Pacifica Graduate Institute.

In 1991 Richard Tarnas published The Passion of the Western Mind, regarded by many scholars such as Joseph Campbell and Huston Smith as one of the finest histories of Western thought ever written. This work serves as a preparatory foundation for a second book containing a more revolutionary perspective. Cosmos and Psyche: Intimations of a New World View challenges the basic assumptions of the modern world view and points towards a new understanding of the human role in an ensouled cosmos. Based on thirty years of research, this book presents evidence that suggests the existence of a systematic correspondence between

planetary movements and the archetypal patterns of human experience. Cosmos and Psyche: Intimations of a New World View won the Book of the Year Prize from the Scientific and Medical Network in England.

Orientation to Place: A Way to Orient to Our Inner Topography

"Move from within. Don't move the way that fear wants you to. Begin a foolish project....Noah did." – Rumi

Path, enclosure, point, horizon, and edge are five dominate elements or archetypes which form a basic spatial vocabulary which describes ways of seeing, thinking, and being in the world. In this lecture and day-long seminar we will explore a dialogue between the landscape in which we dwell in the outer world and an inner landscape of the psyche and that of the inner shared landscape of analyst and analysand.

The spatial orientation we gather from the environments which we live in and travel great distances to experience, gives us rich clues in our on going dialogue with the psyche. Like

a compass, the environment, as 3-D space can be a guide. Each of us experiences the spatial qualities of environment in ways that are as unique as we are, as individuals. However, we must become conscious of how we experience space in order to tap into the creative jewel of psyche that awaits us there. Marie Von Franz wrote that the difference between genius and madness was in the conscious knowing one from the other. One must "stand on a place" in order to "move the world" as Archimendes wrote. Metaphorically and ecologically, Thoreau speaks the truth, "a town is saved, by the contrast of the woods and swamps that surround it." But where does one stand in the town, the woods or the swamp? Each place of orientation offers a unique perspective. Jung himself spent much time on the edges of streams playing with stones. This he regarded essential to his work. The order he gave to these stones came from an inner ordering. "Move from within and begin," Rumi counsels.

The workshop will have two parts: First, we will speak though experiential and clinical material to this outer and inner dialogue. Second, participants will have an opportunity to follow their own journey from an in-depth look at a landscape which has captured them, analyze its quality through two short exercises, one written and one drawn or formed from clay, and then reframe this in the context of an inner space.

At the end of the workshop, participants will have a broader context through which to explore their own clinical and personal vision of the relationship between the space of soil and the space of soul.

Aurore Moursund Maren grew up in Oregon and at the age of four crossed the Atlantic by ship and thus began her fascination with land and waterscapes. After receiving a B.A. in English Literature from the Colorado College, she later attended Oxford University, pursuing her interest in the image of the landscape in literature. She went on to take a Masters degree in Landscape Architecture from Cornell where she presented a thesis on Myth into Landscape in which she transformed the meaning of a verbal myth into landscape forms representational of the myth. She opened her own Landscape Architectural practice and taught courses in Spatial Design at a Community College. During this time her interests in her client's perceptions of the landscape as well as her personal analysis and interest in the works of Carl Jung led her to take a Masters in Clinical Social Work from Columbia. She trained at The New York Psychiatric Institute and New York Hospital and went on to work extensively as a psychiatric School Social Worker. In the following years she commenced her analytic training with the Interregional Society of Jungian Analysts.

After witnessing the 911 attacks, she initiated a program on the NJ Ferries working with persons who had seen the attacks from the water and worked in her private practice with persons experiencing this environmentally related trauma. In the aftermath of Katrina, she self funded her trauma work with persons temporarily housed in the Houston Astrodome.

She now makes her home on an Island in the San Juans exploring the effects of damaged, polluted, or otherwise endangered lands on the psyche.

Larry Kirkhart, Ph.D., & Elizabeth Kirkhart, Ph.D. Lecture: Jung, Psychological Type and Individuation

Objectives:

- Provide a new way to understand Jungian personality functioning using "type" concepts.
- Show a variety of implications of a non-bi-polar treatment of personality concepts.
- Illustrate how type concepts can be related to situational requirements of everyday life.
- Demonstrate how individuation is influenced by personality functioning.

Carl Jung wrote *Psychological Types or the Psychology of Individuation* and published it in 1921. This presentation will consider the question of individuation and psychological type from the non-bi-polar perspective created by June Singer and Mary Loomis in the early 1980's. Without either/or type concepts, personality functioning can be seen from a Jungian perspective in new ways. Instead of viewing a person as a psychological type, it is possible to talk about a person having type capacities. Instead of basing understanding of personality functioning solely on in-born traits, it is now possible to talk meaningfully about personality functioning as the result of in-born traits AND the environment. Absent bi-polar assumptions, a Jungian approach to personality becomes at once more holistic and more readily understood in relation to the process of individuation.

Workshop: Typology, Individuation and Everyday Life

Objectives:

- Without using bi-polar concepts, understand personality functioning from a Jungian perspective.
- Achieve a basic level of ability to assess the requirements of situations using type concepts.
- Understand how to use the relationship between personality functioning and situational requirements of everyday life to promote the client's individuation.

This workshop will be application oriented. It will seek to bring type concepts into everyday life and reduce dependence on psychological inventories as the principle means of understanding how the individual functions. Using a non-either/or approach, emphasis will be placed on how the various type capacities are used in normal living. During the workshop, a variety of situations will be described. These situations and their descriptions will be created by workshop participants using a special framework that significantly demystifies how personality functioning can be related to situational requirements of everyday life. Exploring this relationship, personality functioning and situations, will open a number of ways to understand stress and issues related to individuation.

Immediately prior to Saturday's workshop (9:30 A.M.), participants will have an opportunity to complete and score the Singer-Loomis Type Deployment Inventory (SL-TDI). During the workshop, the results of the SL-TDI will provide a platform to explore how each person's type capacities are typically expressed and consider how to exploit everyday situations as incremental opportunities for further individuation.

Drs. Elizabeth and Larry Kirkhart have worked together since 1979 doing management and organization development consulting. During this time they have engaged in a wide variety of domestic and international assignments. Currently, they are building ways to support the use of the Singer-Loomis Type Deployment Inventory in clinical and organizational settings. This work has involved two major revisions of the Inventory, conducting research onits performance,

developing applications to bridge the results of the Inventory to various settings, and providing qualification training for practitioners. They co-authored, with Dr. Sloane Dugan, "Executive Coaching: A Jungian Approach to Executive Development," Proceedings of International Association for Jungian Studies Conference, London. 2006. 25 pp. (In Press) They wrote "Team Work and the Shadow," Organization Development Network. 1994 Conference, Proceedings. October 1992. pp. 35-64.



Elizabeth Kirkhart, Ph.D., is a licensed psychologist in private practice in Gresham, Oregon. She works from a Jungian perspective and provides therapy to individuals and couples. She is a member of the Board of Directors of the Oregon Psychological Association, and Vice-President of Moving Boundaries, Inc. She teaches a graduate class on Adult Development and Leadership for the Masters Degree in Intercultural Communications sponsored by the Intercultural Institute and Pacific University. Her doctoral thesis, *The Relationship of Age and Sex to Psychological Type* (1991), was a study of the bi-polar assumption underlying Jung's theory of psychological type. It was based on a

sample of over 1,000 Pakistani men and women.



Larry Kirkhart, Ph.D., serves as a consultant to organizations and is the President of Moving Boundaries, inc. He was the President of the Oregon Friends of C.G. Jung and served on the Board for six years. With George Renwick, Ph.D., he teaches, a graduate class called "Culture in the Organizational Context" for the Masters Degree in Intercultural Communications sponsored by the Intercultural Institute and Pacific University. He also teaches an on-line class for Kaplan University's Graduate School of Management in Leadership, Culture and Change. Larry was a tenured faculty member of the University of Southern California for over 17 years where he periodically chaired the Applied

Behavioral Sciences Program and taught a wide variety of courses, including organizational psychology.


