*Lecture & Workshop: Dreaming of Animals,
dialogue between self and world*

“Animals show us in dreams what we need to do to heal ourselves and the Earth” —James Hillman



The Friday lecture will focus on the rich cultural histories of four popular animal archetypes that regularly appear in myth, folktales, and dreams—dogs, deer, bears and birds—and reveal their ecological and psychological importance.

Other animal archetypes will be worked with during the Saturday workshop.

Our dreams, visions, thoughts, and actions determine our personal fate as well as the fate of the world. In the context of current threats to many animal species, let us look at how we think and feel about them, especially the wild ones. Some animals are likely more uniquely important to each of us as individuals than others—perhaps favorites from childhood or power animals. Valerie will provide techniques (dream interpretation, written dialogues, some ritual and movement) for working with animals on inner and outer levels. The aim will be to increase our appreciation for the unity of being, helping the Earth and empowering ourselves.

Valerie Harms is the author of nine books. She is an Intensive Journal consultant and former science editor at the National Audubon Society. She has given workshops at C.G. Jung centers, the New York Open Center, Rowe Conference Center (MA), Wainwright House (NY), Skyros Centre (Greece), and Fairfield &

Lecture: Turning On and Tuning Out—Technology and Psychotherapy


There was a time when the answer-phone was thought too alienating for patients; now there is the question of whether therapists feel OK being paid by electronic bank transfer.

Since the start of modern psychotherapy, much new technology has affected communications—the telephone, transport, and written communication have all been speeded up and made universally accessible. But do email, texts and the mobile (cell) phone enhance communication or do they merely offer *the fantasy of doing so?*

Since the mid-nineteenth century, photographic images have become so prevalent and available that clients can now bring pictures in many forms. They can also bring movies, movie-scenes and characters. How are we to respond to these unconventional communications of our clients' emotional lives? The outward expressions of their inner worlds? Christopher Hauke will talk about these issues with special focus on the place of film themes and images in psychotherapy sessions.

Christopher Hauke, BSc., SAP, IAAP, BPC, UKCP is a Jungian analyst in private practice, a writer, film-maker, and lecturer at Goldsmiths, University of London. His short documentary films have been screened in London and Barcelona and he is finishing his first short drama, see www.againthefilm.com. As a writer he has published *Jung and the Postmodern: The Interpretation of Realities*, and co-edited *Jung and Film: Post-Jungian Takes on the Moving Image* and *Contemporary Jungian Analysis*. His latest book is *Human Being Human: Culture and the Soul*.

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

Eco-Centric Individuation: Bill Plotkin's *Nature and the Human Soul*

To individuate is a subversive act. It requires a person to move against their habitual ego notions about how things are and to reject many of the accepted norms of their culture. Individuation is made more difficult in a time of what Jung called *kairos*, a time of the “changing of the gods”, a time when the worldview of a culture is itself undergoing a rite of passage. In such times, when the myths of our culture are not adequate to lead us into a new way of being, and new myths are not yet here, we have to return to what Thomas Berry called ‘genetic guidance’, the spontaneously creative and mysterious impulses of the world unconscious that originate in the same instincts through which the earth came into being. In short, we have to return to nature. But where can we find guidance that is not itself coming out of the old Cartesian, nature-phobic fantasy that is the problem? To read a text on individuation that is not grounded in such assumptions requires that the author be ‘cured’ of the disease of Cartesianism and have enough of the Bodhisattva in them to want to share their insights in a labor of love, a book. I am pleased to report that Bill Plotkin’s second book, *Nature and the Human Soul: Cultivating Wholeness and Community in a Fragmented World*, fits this bill.

Nature and the Human Soul begins with the idea that humanity is engaged in the process of the Great Turning, the move from an ego-centric industrial growth model of civilization to an eco-centric earth community model that is sustainable into the future. The question is then asked, “What does it mean to become fully human in an eco-centric world?” At a time when most therapeutic models are about coping with the dire consequences of our current circumstances, this is an especially generative question, one that is filled with hope for the future. To answer this question fully, Bill Plotkin dives deeply into the structure of the medicine wheel, the wheel of life, to create one of the most innovative and healing imaginations of the process of individuation that I have ever read. What brings this model to life is Plotkin’s 25 years of experience as a depth psychologist, wilderness guide and eco-therapist, leading individuals into the wild to seek their destiny. The abstractions of life-span stage theory are given pulse and beauty through the heart-rending and soul-stirring stories of the individuals whose experiences illuminate the phases of the wheel of life. More than just another developmental theory, *Nature and the Human Soul* has the potential to be a foundation stone in the New Myth that we so desperately seek.

Bill Plotkin will be coming to the Seattle Jung Society on May 2nd and 3rd to discuss his new book. He will also be conducting a “Soulcraft Intensive” (based on his earlier book, *Soulcraft: Crossing into the Mysteries of Nature and Psyche*) at Chinook Learning Center on April 26–30. 

Bill Plotkin, Ph.D.

Lecture & Workshop: Nature and the Human Soul— Ecocentric Individuation in an Egocentric World

In response to a pervasive hunger for meaning and belonging in our time of global crisis, this lecture and workshop introduces a new ecopsychology of human development that reveals how fully and creatively we can mature when soul and wild nature guide us. The Eco-Soulcentric Developmental Wheel—the subject of Bill Plotkin's new book, *Nature and the Human Soul*—is a model for a human life span rooted in the cycles and qualities of the natural world, a blueprint for individual development that ultimately yields a strategy for cultural transformation.

If it is true that we live in a culture dominated by adolescent habits and desires, then the enduring societal changes we so desperately need won't happen until we individually and collectively evolve into an engaged, authentic adulthood. During this weekend, we'll explore eight stages of human life, each defined by the joining of a human archetype to an Earth archetype — the Innocent in the Nest, the Explorer in the Garden, the Thespian at the Oasis, the Wanderer in the Cocoon, the Soul Apprentice at the Wellspring, the Artisan in the Wild Orchard, the Master in the Grove of Elders, and the Sage in the Mountain Cave — and the challenges and benefits of each. We'll explore how we can progress from our current *egocentric*, aggressively competitive, consumer society to an *ecocentric*, soul-based one that is sustainable, cooperative, and compassionate.

The lecture will be an overview of the Eco-Soulcentric Developmental Wheel. The workshop will focus on the Cocoon and Wellspring stages, provide an experiential introduction to soulcraft practices for addressing the tasks of those stages, and include a discussion of the important differences between psychotherapy and the process of soul initiation.

Bill Plotkin, Ph.D., has been a psychotherapist, rock musician, river runner, research psychologist, and mountain-bike racer. The founder and president of Animas Valley Institute, he has guided thousands of people through initiatory passages in nature since 1980. As a depth psychologist, ecotherapist, and wilderness guide, he leads a variety of experiential, nature-based individuation programs. He is the author of *Nature and the Human Soul: Cultivating Wholeness and Community in a Fragmented World* and *Soulcraft: Crossing into the Mysteries of Nature and Psyche*. His doctorate in psychology (1976) is from the University of Colorado at Boulder.
