Unlocking the Past and Healing Ancestral Complexes



Friday Lecture:

Repetitions of familial complexes influence who we are today - whether these complexes are conscious or not. Unhealed trauma and unfinished business, commitments and decisions, secrets and information withheld can have a profound impact on our psychological and spiritual well being. These legacies remain in the 'ancestral' or 'family' field in the form of ancestral complexes and belief systems that get passes down through generation after generation. Using active imagination, Traditional ceremony, story, and dreams, we can learn to avoid the traps that these complexes have played in our lives. In this lecture we will discuss the ancestral world in both Algonquin First Nations Traditions and Jungian psychology. We will explore ways to open to the 'ancestral field' and bring consciousness to some of the ancestral constellations.

Ceremony for our Dead Saturday Workshop:

Together we will experience some of the ancestral field and welcome both the avowed and disavowed ancestors through Ceremony. We will re-member and honour loved ones and lost ones in the family tree, and welcome those whose names and faces we do not know. We will explore how to work with ancestral complexes and come to increased clarity and understanding of how to carry and be carried by our dead. A ceremonial protocol will be shared with registration.

Muriel McMahon is a Zurich trained Jungian analyst and indigenous elder in the Algon-kin/Kipawa Tradition. She is currently in private practice in Guelph, Ontario, Canada, lectures internationally, co-creates ceremony, and works closely with indigenous teachers and healers from many traditions. Sourcing and sourced by Jungian psychology and Traditional teachings from her maternal heritage, Muriel is deeply interested in the culture of 'ne Dead and the ancestral field. Traditional teachings grounded in and articulated through sound psychological approaches have enabled Muriel to bridge the worlds of her contemporary psychological culture and her ancient wisdom traditions. 

The Religious Nature of the Psyche



Friday Lecture:

The etymology of the word religion reveals the root is "ligare," which means to tie, bind, or connect. For instance, the word ligament is derived from this root. The prefix "re" presumes something has been separated, divided or broken. Religion means to re-connect. The religious nature of the Psyche is to make a whole. The role of symbol and myth is to be a resource for this process.

This lecture will discuss the unhealthy and healthy religious attitude, as well as the archetypal structure which, when made conscious, can be an invaluable resource and process of individuation.

Saturday Workshop:

In lecture, discussion and experiential exercise, this workshop will explore more deeply the religious nature of the psyche and how a healthy religious viewpoint can be an invaluable resource in one's journey to wholeness.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. Clearer understanding how symbols and myths can be resources for individuation.
- 2. An analysis of how unhealthy religion can wound.
- 3. An explanation how a healthy religion can be healing.

J. Pittman McGehee received his Master of Divinity from the Virginia Theological Seminary and was ordained as a priest in the Episcopal Church in 1969. He received an honorary Doctor of Divinity from the Episcopal Seminary of the Southwest. Formerly the Dean of Christ Church Cathedral in downtown Houston, he is currently a Diplomat Jungian analyst and the director of the Institute for the Advancement of Psychology and Spirituality. Additionally, he is serving as the Carolyn Fay adjunct lecturer in Analytical Psychology at the University of Houston. Pittman is widely known as a lecturer and educator in the field of psychology and religion, as well as a published author, poet and essayist.
