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John Ryan Haule, Ph.D.: *Divine Madness*

Friday Evening, September 12th Lecture: *Romantic Love: From Foolishness to Transformation*

Eros sets our ego aside and introduces us to soul. This is the reason love is called foolish and the lovers mad. Jung called such archetypal developments and the demands they make upon us “the masterpiece” in the process of our “individuation.” An alchemical change in our being and threat of our beloved that makes the experience of Eros so powerful lies behind the medieval symbol of a love potion that unites two people forever. In the stories of Tristan and Lancelot, Church authorities confirm that the love potion exempts the lovers even from the accusation of sinfulness. But those tales also describe a naked sword the lovers place between themselves when they sleep together. For love not only draws us toward fusion, it also requires that we maintain a distance that makes psychological growth possible. Ultimately, Eros invites us on a spiritual quest that has cosmic dimensions. Main source: Haule, *Divine Madness*.



Saturday Workshop, September 13th: *The Role of Eros in Analysis plus Lessons Based in Tantra*

In the morning session we will talk about the challenges provoked when eros comes to dominate the therapeutic field of analysis--what it provides and how the analyst can learn to manage its dangers. (Main source: Haule, *The Love Cure*). In the afternoon session we will consider some of the spiritual claims of Tantric practice and how they “map” our differentiation of our feeling function. This tells us a great deal about the nature of transference and counter-transference as well as the process of individuation. (Main source: Haule, *Tantra and Erotic Trance*).



Learning Objectives:

- 1) To understand the structure and dynamics of the Jungian psyche model.
- 2) To appreciate the role of the collective unconscious in erotic experience.
- 3) To find the transformative potential in experiences often dismissed as neurotic.

John Ryan Haule has a doctorate in religious studies from Temple University and a diploma from the C. G. Jung Institute in Zurich. Veronica Goodchild, Ph.D.: *Songlines of the Soul: Pathways to a New Vision for a New Century*

Friday Evening, October 10th Lecture: *Synchronicities and their Historical Background*

This lecture/workshop series is based on Veronica's new book. She will present an overview of the themes of her book, outlining the signatures of a new worldview. This new story focuses on the emergence of the subtle and imaginal realms coming back into prominence as spirit and matter reach out to each other to heal the fractures of a split that has led to a devaluation of the feminine, the repression of the shadow, and the degradation of our Earth. Beginning with synchronicity and the psyche-matter mysteries that lie at its heart, Veronica goes on to explore the collective synchronicities of UFO, Crop Circles, and Near-death Experiences. These signatures of a new worldview point to a *psychophysical* reality that Jung called the *unus mundus*. They identify the resources of wisdom and the unfolding of an eros consciousness, which arises with these extra-ordinary events. Such experiences balance our cultural focus on logos and symbolic thinking with direct experiences of an Other world.

Saturday Workshop, October 11th: *Synchronicities & Strategies for Engagement*

Veronica will focus on collective examples of synchronicity, and include strategies for engagement with the subtle world, practices founded on ancient healing temple sanctuaries and shamanic traditions, European spa culture, walking as pilgrimage, and sacred site visits. In these practices we will try to listen in to how the Earth/psyche is speaking to us at this time of course correction on our planet, and what our vocation both individually and collectively might be at this time.

Veronica Goodchild, Ph.D., has been a core faculty member at Pacifica Graduate Institute since 1999, and a Jungian psychotherapist for over 30 years. She is an elected Affiliate Member of the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts. She teaches courses in the Clinical Psychology, Depth Psychotherapy, and Depth Psychology/Somatics Departments, on Jungian Psychotherapy, Alchemy, Imaginal Psychology, The Grail Myth, Psyche and the Sacred, and Soulful Research. She has lectured and given workshops on these themes both in America, South Africa, and in Europe. She has also written book chapters and journal articles in these areas. Her first book, *Eros and Chaos: The Sacred Mysteries and Dark Shadows of Love*, was published in 2001 by Nicolas-Hays, and republished in 2008. Her most recent book, published by Nicolas-Hays in October 2012 is titled: *Songlines of the Soul: Pathways to a New Vision for a New Century*. This book outlines the features and signatures of a new emerging myth that unites psyche and matter and brings the subtle body and imaginal worlds into prominence. The book also explores the mystical cities of the soul re-visioning healing beyond individuation by recovering ancient incubation practices based on the Asklepeia, water/spa cures, and ancient site visits. This past summer, Veronica continued to explore the shamanic origins of Jung's work, visiting prehistoric cave art in the Dordogne, sites sacred to the Black Madonna and Mary Magdalene in Provence, and goddess temples in Malta. She walked part of the Camino de Santiago de Compostela in the Haute Loire and Aubrac regions of France. These experiences continued to confirm for her how the embodiment of the signatures of the new worldview continues to be challenging and central.

Suzan Rood Wilson, M.A.: *Experiencing the Numinous in Everyday Life: The Daily Quest for a Life of Meaning*

Jung stated in his autobiography, *Memories, Dreams, Reflections* that the images of the unconscious place a great responsibility on a person. When the numinous comes, in whatever form it appears – through a dream, a synchronicity, the striking appearance of something unexpected – it demands that we pay attention. More still, there is an ethical obligation to bring these experiences into our everyday world, where we can be transformed by the power of the experiences and images, as we bring these to life.

Friday Evening, November 14th Lecture: *The Comet: A Wild Ride on the Fiery Tail*

Suzan will tell her story of the manifestation of a dream and will tell the tale of how it has informed her life and work for the last fifteen years. She will describe how working with numinous experiences in clinical practice can open new horizons for clients and therapists alike.


Saturday, November 15th Workshop: *Harnessing the Energy of the Numinous Towards Daily Transformation*

This workshop will be experiential and confidential. Friday Evening, December 12th Lecture: *Becoming a Transforming Leader*

Leadership is a state of mind, not just a role. Any of us can be transforming leaders if we act to make a difference in our families, communities, workplaces, and volunteer/civic activities. Based on Carol's newest book, *The Transforming Leader*, the lecture will include a Jungian approach to transformational ways of thinking about leadership, necessary inner work for leaders, and ways of understanding the inner and often unconscious life of groups and organizations. In the process it will show how understanding, and the ability to apply, concepts like transference, counter-transference, projection, archetype, and shadow have become essential leadership capacities.

Jung's individuation, Campbell's finding your personal myth, the hero's journey; Persephone's abduction into the underworld, the gods and goddess archetypes may help support the choices we make. In this workshop Jean Bolen invites us to remember and connect with our inner compass: it may be what we know in our bones, which as in her book, *Close to the Bone*, is soul knowledge that we may decide to trust in the midst of a potentially terminal illness.
