The Rabbi, the Goddess, and Jung: What Spirit Requires



Lecture: September 8th (7-9pm)

No one who strives for selfhood...is spared this dangerous passage, for that which is feared also belongs to the wholeness of the self. Jung, CW 11 ¶ 849

On the long winding path to becoming oneself there are dangerous passages where monsters lurk. For those who are called by spirit, such monsters may wear the face of early experiences with organized religion. Jung, for example, struggled with the lifeless Protestant theology which entrapped his father, a pastor. Jung had to face the dangerous passage of allowing taboo images to crush his father's church before he could begin to claim his own spiritual experience.

In this lecture I will share some of my own pilgrimage, its dangerous passages, with Jung as my guide. I will weave in poetry, dreams, a journey to a sacred place, and a conversation with a ghost.

Getting the Word from Within - A Writing Workshop

Our spiritual lives are awakened or assailed, shaped or shaken, cultivated or cauterized during our childhoods. In the course of our life pilgrimage we have to come to terms with those beginnings, and to find our way into a mature and grounded spiritual attitude – an ongoing conversation with our soul. If we are lucky, we find sacred places which provide sanctuary for experiencing what the Kabbalah calls “the beyond that lies within.” In this writing workshop we’ll explore our early sense of the divine, the places in which spirit and soul have spoken to us, where and how they speak to us now.

Presenter Biography:

Naomi Ruth Lowinsky is an analyst member of the San Francisco Jung Institute and poetry editor of *Psychological Perspectives*. She is the co-editor, with Patricia Damery, of *Marked by Fire: Stories of the Jungian Way*. She has authored four poetry collections, and won the Blue Light Poetry Prize for her chapbook, *The Little House on Stilts Remembers*. A collection of her essays, *The Rabbi, the Goddess and Jung: Getting the Word from Within*, was published last year.

He is a professor of depth psychology with a Ph.D. in clinical psychology, and a credentialed public schools teacher and counselor. Dr. Aizenstat has explored the power of dreams through depth psychology and his own research for more than 35 years. His Dream Tending methodologies extend traditional dream work to the vision of an animated world where the living images in dream are experienced as embodied and originating in the psyche of Nature as well as that of persons. His work opens creativity and the generative process. His book, *Dream Tending*, describes multiple new applications of dreamwork in relation to health and healing, nightmares, the World's Dream, relationships, and the creative process.

Dreaming Animals: Individuation in a Jungian Analysis



Lecture: November 17th (7-9pm)

"... the animal is sublime and, in fact, represents the "divine" side of the human psyche. You remember that the purpose of the Dionysian mysteries was to bring people back to the animal...the animal within...which then forms a bridge between (her) self and the original primordial man concealed beneath the historical layers of the past..." Jung, VS. p.161

Following a series of animal dreams from a profoundly creative woman artist, we move into and through the individuation process of her eight-year analysis. I was with her through her conscious death. Here we find deep instruction, beauty, and assistance in life's completion. Epiphany—the direct experience of Deity—came to this individual via dreams and in a vision of an animal in the day before her death. I utilize this series of dreams and a discussion of them because I feel the dignity and depth of Jungian Psychoanalysis are illustrated and accessible here.

Dreaming Animals is a presentation that grew out of my deep interest in the appearance of animals in dreams and in the lives of patients and analysts over the course of my forty years of practice. What is the meaning and function of various animals coming to us in dreams or meeting them by chance? Which animals bring us practical education or wisdom, terror, or beauty and joy? Can we relate to a creature with interest, attraction? Who are we afraid of or avoid? Do we have access to archetypal, mythical and imaginary beings? How are we treating animals in dreams and in waking life? What is the relationship between our body and animal body (instinctual life)? What does this tell us about ourselves and as a society and culture? There are many questions to pursue. Images and poetry will assist us.

Penelope Tarasuk, PhD, is a Jungian analyst with 40 years of experience in the field of psychology working with a diverse population. Her workshops and lectures in the United States and abroad focus upon dreaming, active imagination, nature, art and body in spiritual development. She was a member of the Training Board of the C.G. Jung Institute-Boston, is a training analyst, candidate supervisor, and has been on the faculty since 1989. Her book based on this story, *POLISHING THE BONES*, published by Muswell Hill Press (London) and distributed by SUNY Press in North America, is available this fall, 2017.

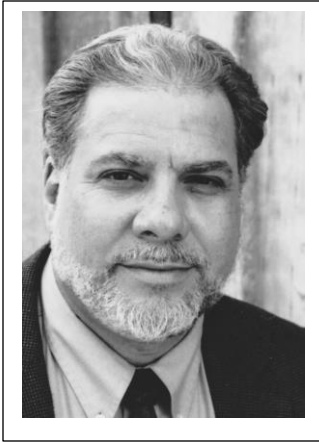

David Schoen, Ph.D., Jungian Analyst

The War of the Gods in Addiction: The Psychodynamics of Addiction, Treatment, and Recovery

Lecture: December 8th (7-9pm)

Dr. Schoen will present an overview of the psychodynamics of addiction, treatment and recovery through the dual lenses of the 12 steps of Alcoholics Anonymous and Jungian psychology. This will be based on the famous correspondence between Bill W. (cofounder of AA) and C. G. Jung. He will describe the development of a typical addiction, its true nature, the importance of archetypal shadow/archetypal evil in the addiction process and why the principles of the 12 steps of AA are the most effective treatment approach in addressing an addiction.

Workshop: December 9th (10am-4pm)

Archetypal Evil of Addiction in Fairy Tale, Myth and Religion

The workshop will be an in depth exploration of the psychodynamics of addiction, treatment and recovery, including the creation of the addiction-shadow-complex. David will address what is involved in the healing process of the (AA) 12 steps from this perspective. He will amplify the concept of archetypal evil and shadow in myth, fairy tale and religion in both ancient and modern times. He will touch on how "Using" dreams of alcoholic and addicted individuals (when someone dreams of participating in his or her own addictive behavior), can be significant in diagnosis, prognosis and treatments. The workshop will be of value for analysts, counselors, 12 step members and their families, as well as for anyone interested in learning more about addictive behavior.

David Schoen, LCSW, MSSW, is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker and Certified Jungian Analyst practicing in Covington, Louisiana, near New Orleans. He has a background as an alcoholism chemical dependency counselor. He is senior analyst in the Inter Regional Society of Jungian Analysts, cofounder and coordinator of the New Orleans Jungian Training Seminar and advisor to the C. C. Jung Society of Baton Rouge. David lectures and teaches nationally, has published internationally, and is a Louisiana poet. His books include *Divine Tempest: The Hurricane as a Psychic Phenomenon* (1998), and *The War of the Gods in Addiction: C. G. Jung, Alcoholics Anonymous and Archetypal Evil* (2009), and *Always a Fighting Tiger: Memoirs of one Ordinary LSU Football Fan*(2014).

Mission and Values Statements

Mission Statement

The purpose of the C. G. Jung Society of Seattle, a nonprofit education corporation, is to support a community centered on the life and work of Carl Gustav Jung. We promote Jung's analytical psychology, which emphasizes the development of the whole person as the path to self-knowledge, creativity and wellbeing. At the Society, we examine the interplay of the conscious and the unconscious through the lens of diverse traditions, including religious, transpersonal and mythological ones. We do this work by organizing lectures, workshops and discussions that provide a forum for people of all walks of life to reflect and grow, individually and collectively.

"Who We Are" Statement

We are a community of lay people, academics, therapists and analysts. We welcome participants from diverse walks of life, interested in growing their knowledge of Jung as a stepping stone to personal transformation. Each lecture and workshop is designed to provide an understanding and experience of the prolific writings of Jung for participants at all levels of previous exposure to analytical psychology. Please note that our program is not a form of therapy nor a substitute for therapy.

Value Statement

We honor and respect the historical roots of Jungian analytical psychology in Western European culture. We also recognize the privileged nature of that culture during Jung's lifetime and Jung's awareness of the limitations that privilege imposes on the psyche. We follow Jung's example by being conscious of the deficits in our cultural climate today. The C.G. Jung Society of Seattle therefore embraces diversity and inclusion. We define diversity in terms of 1) learning approaches and practices (intellectual, applied, experiential); 2) perspectives on his work (classical Jungian thought; post-Jungian and critical interpretations); and 3) perspectives that are more interdisciplinary and/or oriented to the social world). We are working towards combining the entire spectrum of this diversity as we seek to show the relevance of a Jungian psychological lens in our everyday lives.

We also embrace diversity in terms of participants of our community, and therefore include diverse personal and cultural expressions, belief systems and knowledges. We take our cue from Jung's own work, realizing that it is our responsibility to make his interest in the diverse expressions of psychic life pertinent to contemporary societal needs, interests and understandings.

Jung believed that everyone has an unconscious life, and that only by looking to and learning from different cultures can we truly begin to uncover the depths of our psyches. For this reason, he traveled to and studied a multiplicity of cultures: He visited the Taos pueblo in 1925 and wrote about what he learned from Native American culture in *Memories, Dreams and Reflections* (1973); he went to East Africa where over a five-month period he crystallized many of his important psychological concepts; and he traveled to India in 1937, where he learned about the role of symbolism through the study of Hindu philosophy. Jung studied yoga and valued it for its powerful parallels with psychoanalysis and the development of the inner life, believing that the mandala was a symbol of the self. His psychology has further been shown to have powerful affinities with Jewish mystical thought and ancient Egyptian and Mesopotamian mythologies. It is from his travels, studies, personal discoveries and work with his patients that he developed the theories of the collective unconscious--the archetypes that arise from the deepest layers of the soul of humanity shared by all throughout time and history. Examples of this rich cross-fertilization of ideas and practices is manifested in our programs. Moreover, we welcome you to our programs, and look forward to your participation in our community.

Typical kinds of topics presented and discussed at the C.G. Brit Poulson, Ph.D. (nominee for Vice President)

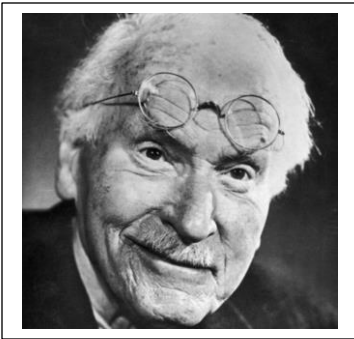

Psyche and the Spirit of the Times – Announcement of a free community service project coming this fall, co-sponsored by Antioch University and the C.G. Jung Society, Seattle

C. G. Jung asserted that we are living in a time of the “changing of the gods” when fundamental values are shifting and the entire culture seems to be undergoing a rite of passage. In this liminal period of uncertainty, we are confronted with deep questions about ourselves, our nation and the future. What does the election of Donald Trump portend? In the era of Trumpism, what psychological and spiritual resources can we draw upon to confront fear, strengthen the soul, and become better citizens? Of what value are The Good, the True and The Beautiful in times such as these? What is America’s destiny and its role in the fate of the earth?

Psyche and the Spirit of the Times is a community service project that was initially constellated around the American election of 2004. That election served to illuminate the fault lines of the American psyche as it split over fundamental issues of war, the economy, and the environment. The goal of Psyche and the Spirit of the Times was to initiate a series of community dialogues that moved beyond typical political and economic categories to include the experience and wisdom of the psyche. In doing so, our aim was to take psyche out of the privacy of the therapy room and into the public domain where we could discuss how the structure and dynamics of the psyche were operating in the American election. In her new book, *The Rabbi, the Goddess, and Jung: What Spirit Requires*, Naomi Ruth Lowinsky writes about how Johann Wolfgang von Goethe's play, *Faust*, influenced Jung throughout his life. Faust's arrogance and his desire to control natural forces reminded me of our present day conflict over climate change and even our long held faith in "progress."

I was curious about the inscription "Faust's Repentance" at Bollingen and found this at the Philemon Foundation. "In *Faust*, Act V, Goethe has Faust build a city on land reclaimed from the sea. In order to accomplish this task, Faust tells Mephistopheles that he wants Philemon and Baucis, who lived on this land, moved. To Faust's ultimate horror, instead of doing so, Mephistopheles decides to burn their cottage with Philemon and Baucis inside.
