Dear Members and Friends,

We welcome you to this Solstice Season! With the arrival of the New Year and in anticipation of the Return of Light we look forward to our Winter and Spring 2024 Program Season. Full details of our offerings can be found in this newsletter and on our website. We have a robust and timely set of study groups, lectures and workshops lined up for you.

This Winter the Board has undertaken a Membership Campaign.

As you know, we launched a new website in the fall of 2022. This was a major undertaking for our Society and yielded a beautiful website full of great information. However, as Co-Presidents, we have been made aware of some software problems that affected the membership renewal process. We are truly sorry for any inconvenience this has caused. In response, we are going over our membership list to identify those who have been impacted by this problem. Our goal is to contact every current and former member to make sure you are able to use our website without encountering a problem in the system. In addition, we are using this outreach opportunity to get to know you better and to listen to how we can better serve your interests..

We are also launching a Fundraising Campaign.

It has been a long time since we reached out to the membership for special financial assistance. In the past three years, we invested significant financial resources in the creation of the new website, and we have ongoing monthly expenses of office rent and operations overhead, which are not fully covered by membership fees and ticket sales. All of our Board and Committee members are volunteers.

The Magic Circle: Gaming, Games, and Gamers

The Magic Circle is an archetypal concept appearing in alchemy, the séance and the Tibetan mandala alike—but it is also frequently used to describe the unique world that people enter into when agreeing to play a game. What is the archetypal dimension of gaming? Games are a polarizing subject, often villainized, but equally often loved and celebrated. From a point of tension between these opposites, what can we see about what the game provides us, as well as what it steals? This talk embarks on a Jungian analysis of these questions, weaving in dreams, fairy tales, and game experience from games as ancient as Go to present-day DOTA. The talk also involves discussion of the cultural games we play to facilitate social experience, the uses of gaming for ego development, and the dangerous spectre of gaming addiction.

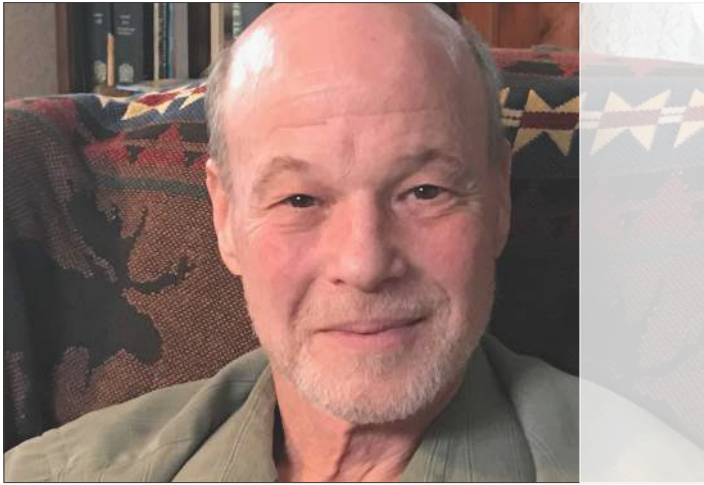
Games as Myths and Dreams

Edward Tick, Ph.D. is an archetypal psychotherapist, author, educator, international pilgrimage guide, and peace activist. He is on the board of the Western Massachusetts Jung Association. An expert on ancient Greece, the origins of medicine and psychotherapy, and healing the invisible wounds of war, his books *The Practice of Dream Healing* and *War and the Soul* are modern classics. His latest book is *Soul Medicine: Healing Through Dream Incubation, Oracles, Visions, and Pilgrimage*. Ed has pioneered archetypal and culturally based healing for over forty years. In addition to his private practice, Ed works in Greece, Viet Nam, Russia, Ukraine, and elsewhere, on holistic and spiritually based healing, the restoration of ancient practices, and soul-healing after war and violent trauma. He has guided 23 healing pilgrimages to Greece and 19 to Viet Nam. Author of eight previous books translated into several languages, Ed uses Greek and other ancient traditions extensively in healing, writing, and teaching.

“The Soul in Apocalypse”

We live in apocalypse, and all suffer “extinction anxiety.” Apocalypse is the violent end of the world order we have known through the surfacing of the collective shadow of all that has been denied and repressed. Such times are inherently cosmic and archetypal. They herald the possibility of either individual and world re-creation or utter destruction.

What are the archetypal conditions of apocalypse? How does it reshape our inner as well as outer worlds? And how can we awaken, energize, and restore soul and bring it to bear on these conditions such that we aid in self, community, and world re-creation?

Through lecture, exercises, and discussion we will consider the archetypal conditions of both apocalypse and soul, explore how they collide in our personal and professional lives and our contemporary world, and consider how we might relearn the ways of soul to help heal our troubled times.

Eco-Wisdom: Reclaiming an Integral Lifeworld

To Jung, the human psyche is situated within the world psyche, and the entire universe is soulful. Our split from nature and the numinous truncates our lives and wounds our souls. We hunger for meaning beyond materiality, patriarchy, and rationality in a dismembered world. From numinous realms such as dreams, symbols, signs, and synchronicities to the innate wisdom of embodiment and the rhythms of the earth, lifeworld domains are like nested ecosystems, enhancing one another while engendering individuation. Lifeworlds merge into a multiple-dimensional ecosystem, like a three-dimensional mandala. From an indigenous perspective, individuation is rooted in these realms and serves more than the individual. An authentic self serves unity in diversity. Eco-wisdom and Indigenous knowledge enhances and enlarges Jung's concepts of individuation, archetypes, the numinous, and the collective unconscious. The Coast Salish matriarchal cultures offer ancient proven wisdom on restoring and tending a whole life with a whole self.

Reclaiming Radiant Interconnection

This workshop is rooted in ancient, personal, and mythic stories. With permission from a traditional Coast Salish storyteller, pertinent teaching stories will be told that serve as touchstones and jumping-off places for reflecting on our place in the World Soul. The guiding tenants of stories from an indigenous matriarchy are equality, respect, acknowledgment, inter-being, and generosity. In a similar way, our personal stories of signs, dreams, initiations, and nature, guide and connect us. Indigenous stories engender reflection, questions, and fresh perspectives on individuation, the collective unconscious, archetypes, and the World Soul. For example, the Samish people embraced eight genders. Each gender became recognized by an archetypal pattern -- the healer, the ceremonialist, etc., -- and each contributed to the tribe. In this workshop we will delve deeper into the causes of despair and dismemberment, hyper-individualism, hierarchy, and disconnection from nature and we will seek ways to reclaim radiant interconnection through story.

Steven Herrmann, PhD, MFT, is a certified Jungian analyst and an analyst member of the C.G. Jung Institute of San Francisco; a member of the International Association for Analytical Psychology (IAAP); International Association for Jungian Studies (IAJS); and California Association for Marriage and Family Therapists (CAMFT). Dr. Herrmann has a private practice in Montclair Oakland, California, where he sees individual adults and couples. He is a depth psychotherapist, poet, writer, presenter, and teacher. He has published over fifty professional papers, book reviews, and essays, as well as several book chapters and seven books that have been well received. Steven's 2015 book *Spiritual Democracy: The Wisdom of Early American Visionaries for the Journey Forward* provides the primary text for his talk and workshop.

Spiritual Democracy and the World Soul: A Jungian Vision for the Future

Spiritual Democracy is an idea whose time has come. It is uniquely American, founded upon the Iroquois myth of the Peacemaker, and it found its most eloquent voice in early American poetry. It exists in three stages: 1) political, 2) economic, and 3) religious. Spiritual Democracy is linked to the cosmic science of nineteenth century naturalist Alexander von Humboldt, whose work Walt Whitman, Herman Melville, and Emily Dickinson were all well aware of. It is found in the pragmatism of William James and the works of C.G. Jung. Spiritual Democracy is an ideal that involves making the shadow conscious; it is not a condition of peace alone. Spiritual Democracy advocates responsibly living out one's vocation as a path of sacred action. Today we need to understand the foundation stone of Spiritual Democracy, which is central to the mythos of America, to combat the toxic political climate in which we are living.

Spiritual Democracy: Its Current Relevance in American Culture and Jungian Analysis

In this workshop we'll be examining Jung's vision of a spiritually democratized world grounded in a sense of the common reality of the psyche along with the great 19th century explorer Alexander von Humboldt's feeling for the immense unity-in-diversity that he perceived when contemplating the entire Cosmos. I'll be drawing a connection between Humboldt, William James, and Jung, great figures on either side of Walt Whitman, in an effort to give participants a synoptic view of how the notion of Spiritual Democracy incubated itself throughout the 19th and 20th centuries. As a Jungian analyst, I believe Spiritual Democracy is the logical outcome of an important line of the later Jung's thoughts, since behind it lies the idea of the *unus mundus*, Latin for "one world": the result of bringing spirit, soul, and body together in a transformative, alchemical synthesis, a convergence of science, poetry, and religion that could unite the world.

She is a Certified Mindfulness Meditation Teacher and Mentor and has additional training in Indigenous African Spiritual Technologies, DreamTending, the Process of Council and the Therapeutic Uses of Puppetry. She has been a practicing psychotherapist for over 35 years and maintains a practice in Denver, CO. The foundation of her work lies in the psychology of C.G. Jung, Indigenous Science, Buddhism, and the experience of the undivided relationship between the embodied world and the psyche.

Jung and the Ancestors: Mending the Ancestral Web

In this lecture, we will explore ideas from my book, Jung and the Ancestors: Beyond Biography. Mending the Ancestral Web. Jung's conceptualization of the collective unconscious provides a psychological framework that, like genetics, allows us to trace the footprints of our ancestors across time and space. According to Jung, the collective unconscious is "the mighty deposit of ancestral experience accumulated over millions of years." The idea that our ancestors have any kind of existence beyond this earthly one, much less that they have a desire to be in relationship with us, is unusual for many of us in modern Western culture. At its heart, it's about restoring balance and harmony within oneself and one's lineage in service to love flowing more freely within and through the generations across time and space.

Ancestral Soul Work

In this workshop, we will explore more experientially the ideas from my book on Jung and the Ancestors in response to the question, "How can we come into a more conscious relationship with our ancestors?" Learning goals include the following:

- Discover how your physical, mental and emotional symptoms, dreams, vocation, fate and destiny are part of a continuing story with deep roots in your ancestry and your descendants.
- Identify and clear ancestral patterns which "haunt" your lineage.
- Experience the support, guidance, wisdom, and love of your ancestors.
- Create a personal ancestor altar.
- Develop a personal practice to honor and maintain a conscious relationship with your ancestors.

Week 1:

We will examine and define terms found in Jung's original model of the structure of the psyche: Persona, Ego, Shadow, Anima/Animus, Self, Complexes, Archetypes, and Individuation.

Week 2:

Dreams: Amplification of the subjects covered in Week 1. Film showing: *Appointment with the Wise Old Dog*.

Week 3:

Typology: Introvert/Extravert, Thinking/Feeling, Intuition/Sensation.

Week 4:

Alchemy and Transformation.

In this four week class, we will cover basic concepts and terminology of Jung's theory of analytical psychology. For those new or relatively new to Jung, this is your chance to get an overview of Jung's broad and deep theory, which will help orient you to our lectures and other Jungian offerings.

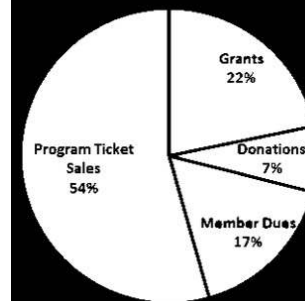
ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT, by Laura Rivendell

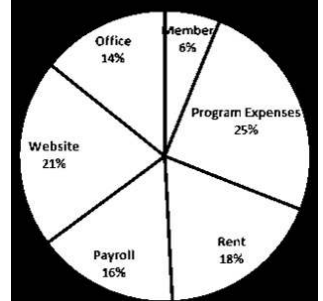

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Library Corner

Dear Friends of the Library,

As I approach my two-year anniversary as the volunteer librarian for the C. G. Jung Society of Seattle, I hope to use this short piece to introduce you our Good Shepherd Center in-person events and to share my growing sense that the lifeblood of our organization pulses through the library.

If you haven't yet visited, our library makes its home in the stately brick building of the Good Shepherd Center, with its stained-glass eyes gazing out across the graceful grounds. Walking up the red steps, a visitor turns left and left again, opening the door to Room 222. The walls are lined with bookshelves housing over 2000 books bought, donated, and cared for by members over almost three decades.

Three ongoing in-person events infuse me with energy whenever I get a chance to participate. Others express a similar experience and gratitude for the time spent together with like-minded people. These include:

Jung Café. Jung Café hosts a lively Saturday drop-in conversation grounded in Jungian ideas. Started in early 2022, the Jung Café is the beloved, self-sustaining legacy of previous board member, office manager, and newsletter editor Akesha Baron. Returning to the library after a Jung Café, I often notice that books have been opened, bought, returned, and checked out, and I smile with satisfaction.

Library Volunteer Meetings. Earlier this year, Jacob Cookston—a previous board member and membership coordinator, now organizing library volunteers—and I initiated twice yearly informational and social meetings for the library volunteers. At September's meeting, volunteers cheered when I finally showcased our new online searchable catalog hosted by Library Thing's TinyCat (https://jungseattle.org/tc_print_library/). It isn't finished, but many volunteers are helping with the time-consuming work of entering barcodes and book numbers. Our shared sense of accomplishment felt delicious.

Jung Study Group. In September, the library started hosting a monthly study group reading Jung's *Dream Analysis: Notes on the Seminar Given in 1928-1930*.
