Co-President Remarks from Randy Morris, Ph.D.

Dear Members,

Welcome to the Winter 2025 series of offerings by the C. G. Jung Society, Seattle! We have some great learning opportunities to offer you. From the deepest interiority of the human soul to outer Noospheric imagination, our speakers will be addressing ways to 'Liberate Soul in Service to the Great Turning'. Our fall Jungian Wisdom School series on "Earth, Cosmos, Psyche: Navigating Planetary Initiation" started off our 2024-25 program year by introducing ideas and practices that can serve as a compass to navigate the turbulent waters of our culture. Such communities are needed more than ever as the evidence that we are living in the midst of a global psychic epidemic of epic proportions becomes more apparent.

This much I know is true: the outcome of this election will not alter the fundamental human drive towards individuation and meaning. We will still need community learning circles where we can explore shadow dynamics, along with the highest nobilities of the human soul. We will still need companions on the journey to discern the thread that runs like gold through the tapestry of our lives. We will still need to rub up against the Sacred. The aspiration of the Seattle Jung Society is to create the conditions for the possibility of accessing this kind of grace, the gift of living a soulful life.

So join us on these learning adventures with luminaries in the Jungian depth psychology community, along with talented individuals from our local community. And consider helping us out. When you look in the mirror who do you see?

The real, imposter, a role, or a true self? The 'as-if' person usually wears a mask presenting through the persona of facade, living in fantasy and illusionary worlds. The psychological issues affect intimacy with oneself and others through escaping the present. The results often include feelings of not belonging, sexual addiction, conflicts around aging, the cultural influence of social media, body image and the predominance of split selves. All these aspects are promoted by our culture of social media and narcissism where reality and illusion are often blurred. The purpose of exploring the 'as-if' and imposter personality is to nurture the process of individuation and self-reflection in a more complete mirror. This can replenish both the personality and the culture.

January 18, 2025. 1:00 pm - 4:00 pm (ONLINE)

Focus on the superficial is synonymous to the emptiness and deadness of our current times, accentuating the need for Eros or emotional relatedness. The discussion of the imposter and 'as-if' personality centers on the Bluebeard fairytale and what it reflects about our current person and culture. The male figure is monstrous, a killer, yet believed by all. We look at dreams and people examples that depict Bluebeard as an internal predator, masquerading, an imposter and functioning 'as-if' normal. How is our inner world, social media, the lure of AI all drawing us from an individual position to being collective robots? Where are the instincts, the life force and how do we wrest ourselves from this fascist state of mind and the grip of the complex? Are we living false or true and what is the difference?

We are very excited to be hosting Jungian Analyst Dr. Ann Ulanov for our February 2025 offering. Dr. Ulanov, M. Div., Ph.D., L.H.D. is esteemed in the Jungian world.

She is a member of the Jungian Psychoanalytic Association of New York and International Association for Analytical Psychology. She has an analytic practice in New York City and is well known for her lectures nationally and internationally. In the past two years she has presented webinars in order to aid the analysts and people of Ukraine.

Dr. Ulanov is the Christine Brooks Johnson Professor Emerita of Psychiatry and Religion at Union Theological Seminary. She co-authored six books with her late husband, Barry Ulanov, including the *Healing Imagination*. Since his death, she has written numerous books, the latest of which is *Back to Basics* (2022). Dr. Ulanov is the recipient of multiple awards in the field, including the Gradiva Award for the best book in Psychiatry and Religion 2002 from the National Association for the Advancement of Psychoanalysis for *Finding Space: Winnicott, God, and Psychic Reality* and the Oscar Pfister award from the American Psychiatric Association for her work in depth psychology and religion.

Dr. Ann Ulanov will present a three-hour webinar with new material on the morning of February 22, 2025. Details about registration will be sent by JPA Seattle and the Seattle Jung Society to all of their members. Members of each group will receive the same discounted registration fee. Susan E. Schwartz, Ph.D., trained in Zurich, Switzerland as

a Jungian analyst is also a clinical psychologist. She appears on many podcasts and presents at numerous Jungian conferences and teaching programs in the USA and worldwide. Susan has articles in journals and chapters on Jungian analytical psychology.

Her books are: The Absent Father Effect on Daughters, Father Desire, Father Wounds translated into several languages; Imposter Syndrome and the 'As-If' Personality: The Fragility of Self (2023); A Jungian Exploration of the Puella Archetype: Girl Unfolding (2024) and An Analytical Exploration of Love and Narcissism (2025), all published by Routledge. Her Jungian analytical practice is in Paradise Valley, Arizona and website is <u>www.susanschwartzphd.com</u>.



Ed Tick, Ph.D., is an archetypal psychotherapist, author, educator, international pilgrimage guide, and peace activist. He is on the board of the Western Massachusetts Jung Association. An expert on ancient Greece, the origins of medicine and psychotherapy, and healing the invisible wounds of war, his books The Practice of Dream Healing and War and the Soul are modern classics.

His latest book is *Soul Medicine: Healing Through Dream Incubation, Oracles, Visions, and Pilgrimage.* Ed has pioneered archetypal and culturally based healing for over forty years. In addition to his private practice, Ed works in Greece, Viet Nam, Russia, Ukraine, and elsewhere, on holistic and spiritually based healing, the restoration of ancient practices, and soul-healing after war and violent trauma. He has guided 23 healing pilgrimages to Greece and 19 to Viet Nam. Author of eight previous books translated into several languages, Ed uses Greek and other ancient traditions extensively in healing, writing, and teaching.



Marilyn C. Strong has a B.A. in Religion and Adult Education through Antioch University West and an M.A. in Spirituality and Culture from Matthew Fox's Institute for Culture and Creation Spirituality. Marilyn has worked in the areas of educational design and development and in group facilitation, ritual, music, and celebration. As a Jungianoriented spiritual counselor, an ordained minister, a ceremonialist, a singer, and a trained Death Midwife, Marilyn leads workshops, facilitates weddings, memorial services, and home and family funerals. After years of exploration and teaching on the Divine Feminine, she currently offers on-line courses and leads small groups of women on pilgrimage to Black Madonna/Mary Magdalene sites in France.

Jerry Wennstrom was born in New York 1950 and lived-out the first half of his art career there. In 1979, realizing his limits as a studio painter, he destroyed his large body of art, gave away his possessions, and trusted the spirit of creation to carry his life. He threw himself out into the new life, penniless and homeless, for fifteen years. He "returned to the world" on Whidbey Island, met his now-wife, Marilyn Strong, and began doing art again. Jerry's unusual life story, was made into the Parabola documentary film, In the Hands of Alchemy, 2000 and Sentient Publications books, *The Inspired Heart: An Artist's Journey of Transformation*, 2002 and Wennstrom's magnum opus, *A Second Wind: Art Resurrected*, 2024, The latter picks up the story and shows the work that emerged in the last twenty-five years. Celebratory in nature, this work integrates joyful embodiment and reveals the golden thread of a long and magical journey.



Brian Thomas Swimme, Ph.D., is Professor Emeritus of Cosmology at the California Institute of Integral Studies, in San Francisco. The department he co-founded, "Philosophy, Cosmology, and Consciousness" (PCC), is the only graduate program in the Western world that places equal emphasis on contemporary science, indigenous spirituality, classical philosophy, and feminist thought for its Masters and Doctoral programs.

He and his colleagues at CIIS created this program in order to re-imagine the human species as a mutually enhancing member of the Earth community. The author of many books, Dr. Swimme's work, both as a writer and a teacher, is committed to shaping the leadership necessary for profound, progressive transformation of social institutions and individual consciousness in service to a thriving planet.

From the desk of Russell Lockhart.

Russell Lockhart, Ph.D. was born and educated in Los Angeles and received his doctorate in human psychophysiology from the University of Southern California. He was trained as a Jungian Analyst at the C.G. Jung Institute Los Angeles where he served as Director of Analyst Training. Since 1982 he has lived and practiced Jungian Analysis in the Pacific Northwest. In addition to such publications as *Words as Eggs: Psyche in Language and Clinic*, and *Psyche Speaks: A Jungian Approach to Self and World*, Dr. Lockhart is also a poet, publisher, artist, and novelist. The Seattle Jung Society is honored to host an archive of his writings available to all members on our website, <u>www.jungseattle.org</u>.

One of my favorite things I did when teaching was to give seminars on writing. In the late 70s, 80s and into the 90s, I did several of these with analysts, candidates, lay groups, and others. My basic approach was to illustrate various ways to "write from the inside out." My intent was to get people to write from where dream and word, like twins, are born, that is, from the depths of psyche and not from the ego. Almost all writing books are useless in this regard. One major exception is Robert Olen Butler's book, From Where You Dream: The Process of Writing Fiction. This is the one book on writing I recommend without reservation. The year 1992 was the high point for me in what I was trying to do. I organized a large public event sponsored by Pacifica Graduate Institute which was entitled, "Writing Inside Out." The speakers were Annie Dillard, Allen Ginsberg, Natalie Goldberg and me. Later that year, I represented the United States at the 12th Arts Festival at Dunvegan Castle, Isle of Skye, Scotland. I gave two talks: "Writing from the Inside of the Inside," and "The Cost of Poetry and the Price of Its Loss." What I did at each of these venues was spontaneous and improvisational. There are no recordings and no texts. Part of my desire to do a writing seminar again is to recapture the spirit of these presentations and make them available once again. If you have any interest in writing or deepening your writing in relation to in-depth psychological work, I invite you to participate in this seminar.

We have such interesting discussions and get to know each other as we share our reflections on the reading and how it weaves into our lives (or not!)

Some of our recent discussions have been based on chapters from: Working the Soul by Charles Poncé, Romancing the Shadow by Connie Zweig and Steve Wolf, Life's Daughter/Death's Bride by Kathie Carlson, Living an Examined Life by James Hollis. Many more to come!

In this seminar, we read and discuss C. G. Jung's magnum opus, *The Red Book*, which details his encounter with the unconscious from the years 1913-1930. Over the past year, we were blessed by the generosity of a few significant donations from the leadership team and several other members, an increase in membership as well as proceeds from our recent silent auction. We were able to end our fiscal year in the black, after two years of deficits. This is good news, indeed.
